

Letter From Nick Coulson, Chairman of the WHRA

Birds and the Bees visit Well Hill

This will be my third Summer on the Hill. From my position up here looking out over the Downs, the views are wonderful, but it has to be said the Winter can be cruel. The rain on some mornings seems to meet me horizontally as I struggle to keep the door from trapping me behind it as I release the catch. At times I lay in bed listening to the wind and have to give myself confidence that the roof survived the 1987 hurricane as far as I can tell. But every season has its pluses, despite all of the trouble the snow caused, especially for us up here on the Hill. Surely the splendour of the scene would have inspired Samuel Palmer, (the famous landscape artist of the early 1800s who immortalised our local landscape). As Winter creeps into Spring and Summer it's hard to imagine the trees in a state of undress and the memories of trying to separate snow from gravel to reach the so distant gate to the Lane seem like a dream. But now the Hill is beautiful, and kind. The animals are out and about. The Fox and her cubs, the Blackbird busies herself teaching her chicks to fly and the Rabbits have given us another generation to ensure anything I plant will never get bigger than about 3 inches.

This Summer is a special one on Well Hill as this year, if you listen carefully you can hear the sound of crying babies. Trust me, the M25 cannot compete on its noisiest days. Yes there has been a population explosion, well maybe that's a bit of an exaggeration. I understand 4 - 5 babies have been born or are due. She is being fed on my practice Rock cakes until she reaches this goal, so if she doesn't make it, I'll select the best one and submit it on her behalf. It's one of my favourite events since I moved to the Hill. It is unique and really brings the two villages together and I look forward to it tremendously. So much so that next year I intend to have go at some fruit and veg myself. I was supposed to have a go this year but I kind of fell behind on account of taking longer to decorate the nursery and other rooms than it did for my wife to create a whole new human being. Also we have the string quartet on Saturday the 12th of July which I must confess I didn't make last year but I intend to support it this year. (apparently there are cream teas!). So enjoy the summer and please do come to the local events and meet the neighbours. You never know, in a few years time you may get your grass cut for less than the minimum wage - I doubt it mind you these days but you never know! And may I congratulate all those new parents and sympathise with all those new dads who are getting poked in the ribs at 4. a.m. to be told "it's your turn"...

<u>B</u><u>B</u><u>B</u><u>B</u><u>B</u> **PRODUCE SHOW RECIPES** Crunchy Top Lemon Cake 4oz/100g soft margarine, 🗳 60z/175g caster sugar, 60z/175g self-raising flour 蓾 1 teaspoon baking powder, 👮 2 eggs, 🝯 4 tablespoons milk, f Finely grated rind of 1 lemon 🔮 For the crunchy topping: Juice of 1 lemon, 4oz/100g sugar 💐 Pre-heat the oven to 180C/350F/Gas4. Lightly grease and base line a 7"/18cm deep round cake tin with greaseproof paper. Measure all the ingredients for the cake into a large bowl and beat well for about 2 minutes until smooth and well blended. Turn the mixture into the prepared tin and level the 🔿 surface. Bake in the pre-heated oven for about 35-40 minutes or until the cake is cooked. Whilst the cake is baking, make the crunchy topping. Mix the lemon juice and sugar together until blended. When the cake comes out of the oven, spread the topping over the top whilst the cake is still hot. **Smartie Biscuits** 💐 4oz/100g margarine, 4oz/100g light muscovado sugar, 🗃 1 tablespoon golden syrup 🕱 60z/150g self-raising flour, 3oz/85g smarties (3 standard tubes). Pre-heat the oven to 150C/350F/Gas 4. Beat margarine and sugar in a bowl 💐 until light and creamy. Beat in syrup, work in half the flour. Stir in the smarties with the remaining flour and work the dough together with your fingers. Divide 🕸 into 14 balls, place them well apart on a baking tray. Do not flatten them. Bake for 12 minutes until golden at the edges. Cool on a wire rack.
