SEVENOAKS DISTRICT COUNCIL COMMUNITY SAFETY UNIT


Improvements in public safety and tackling anti-social behaviour will take another step forward when Sevenoaks District's first ever joint Community Safety Unit officially opens on 3 September 2009.

The new unit, jointly run by Sevenoaks District Council and Kent Police, will be based in Sevenoaks District Council's Argyle Road offices.

It will enable a faster, more co-ordinated response to anti-social behaviour and other community safety concerns and will allow the partners to carry out more preventative work.

It also brings a number of other Council teams involved in community safety, including licensing and environmental health, in closer contact with the Police. Other partners, including Kent County Council, West Kent and Moat housing associations, Kent Fire & Rescue Service, the Probation Service and others will all benefit from closer contact, leading to an improved service for residents.

From now on residents can call just one number, 01732 227000, to report non-emergency community safety issues or receive advice on anti-social behaviour, fly-tipping, graffiti, issues about licensed premises, abandoned vehicles, environmental nuisance and neighbourhood watch. Letter From Nick Coulson, Chairman of the WHRA

We all I think love Well Hill, and this little corner of Kent, but living so close to the capital, in a county that was once known as the Garden of England, though these days it has become the Gateway to Europe, with all its infrastructure and transport links. I am afraid it could now be known as England's Industrial Park. The pressures that surround us are immense. Those of you who fought the M25 when it came through must be only to aware of this. Our farming industry, in particular in Kent where vast industrial farming is ill suited has suffered. Kent, known for its soft fruit farming has been under attack for many years. This year I read a report that plum growers are leaving fruit to rot on the ground as they cannot find a market against cheaper imports. One of the major supermarkets which is always banging on about its local produce and environmental credentials reassured us all by stating that 35% of its plums were locally grown. Well give them a medal, that is big of them. I suppose that stating that 65% of our plums are sourced abroad doesn't sound quite so good does it. Anyway I digress.

What all this means essentially is that land that so much trouble is made to protect and maintain as it has been for years no longer has a purpose. Landowners are under great pressure on the one hand to maintain the countryside for us and future generations to enjoy and on the other to support their families. What therefore, I ask, is the price of a Victoria plum?

Living so close to a major conurbation, there is one certain way out for the desperate and the unscrupulous. WASTE. Waste is big business, and the more controlled it becomes in its disposal the higher the reward for cheating the system becomes.

However thankfully the laws and regulations pertaining to waste disposal are strict and are enforced with vigour. The regulations are numerous, but the basic rule of thumb is this, nothing can be brought on to a site of any kind and this includes soil in any quantity from elsewhere unless and exemption waste management license has been applied for. The source of the waste must ensure it is being disposed of appropriately and the hauler must ensure that parties at either end have the appropriate paperwork. That includes you the home owner. It's no good allowing a builder, or other contractor to cart away waste. You must be seen to have taken due care to ensure that it is being disposed of legally. If it is traced back to you in a case such as fly tipping you could find your self fined. To give you an idea, farmers have been prosecuted for importing rubble to surface tracks and to fill in 'holes' for the purpose of land reclamation. Sites utilising hardcore or 'inert waste' legally have been prosecuted when that waste was found to include wood, metal and other such material .

Also waste produced on site is considered 'stored' waste and this also is subject to a raft of regulations. You cannot demolish a building and just use the waste to resurface a track for example without informing the Environment Agency.

Unfortunately the credit crunch has seen land values drop and it has become harder to make the land pay. We should be vigilant in our area that landowners do not give in to the temptation to make some hard cash by a little it of waste disposal and we should all do our bit to ensure that we are not unwittingly contributing to it.

If you do suspect that someone is receiving waste and depositing it on their land, or would like some advice on your own waste disposal, you should immediately call the Environment Agency on 0800 807 060. These guys are good, they are probably the one Government Agency that works for us without giving the impression that it exists for its own purpose. They will put you through to your area man and he will deal with it and trust me they will. They are the Sweeny of the waste world. The other Agency to call is Sevenoaks Council Environment Protection Team on 01732 227 000 or Email Environment.protection@sevenaoks.gov.uk.

The other thing we can all do, is seek out that British Apple or that Victoria Plum. If your supermarket has little British produce ask why not, or try another. Mrs Coulson once bought some French apples, I made her go back and change them. Admittedly I have paid for that act of insurrection many times over, but I feel it is a smaller price than those men of Waterloo and Trafalgar paid to protect England's green and pleasant land and if you like to see an English Orchard and care about the landscape around you, then look after its custodians, don't just give them the bill, help them pay it.

VOTER REGISTRATION

Register to vote in the next Parliamentary General Election Residents of the District can expect to receive some important documents in the coming weeks. From 1 September voter registration forms are being sent to households throughout the area by Sevenoaks District Council. Details can once more be confirmed online or by using the popular freephone service.

Additionally for the first time, residents whose details remain the same can use the new text registration service, and text their unique reference number to confirm no change of details.

All of these methods save bringing or sending the forms back to the Council. A simple help sheet that explains how to use all of these services and answers the most frequently asked questions, is enclosed with the registration form.

Anyone who doesn't want to lose their vote in the forthcoming election should not delay in responding to the form, whether by phone, online, text or by posting the voter registration form back to the Council Offices. Only those people whose names are on the electoral register will be able to vote at the forthcoming Parliamentary General Election.

At Castle Farm, the lavender and wheat are all safely harvested, dried and stored and they are already cultivating the fields. The hop season is underway and they are already being asked for items for harvest festival displays of wheat sheaves and wheatstooks.

The FRESH HOP BINES are full and green and smelling wonderful. They will be available from now until mid September. It's always better to get them early in the season if possible. DRIED HOP BINES will be ready from 1st September. There's a heavy crop of APPLES ripening in the orchard and they will be starting the PICK YOUR OWN as soon as they are ready in early September.
