

POLICING - Neighbourhood Watch

The Residents' Association are revitalising the Neighbourhood Watch. First of all, there will be new neighbourhood watch signs, paid for by Shoreham Parish Council, for Well Hill and a replacement sign for Cockerhurst. Can you help us by being an area warden? We need one warden for up to fifteen houses. The work is not onerous - it just involves letting neighbours know when suspicious people are in the area. If you can help, please come to:

POLICING - Reorganisation

Nationally, Kent Police will remain a standalone force and will not be merged with other forces. However, there is a local reorganisation that is taking place.

At present Kent Police is organised into 9 divisions. They plan to reduce this to 6 over the next 18 months. The Well Hill Area (in Kent) is policed by North Kent Police in Park Gate and West Kent Police in Cockerhurst and Well Hill.

There is a Government requirement for police areas to be coterminous with district and borough council boundaries. This is not the case for Sevenoaks District Council which is policed by North Kent and West Kent. Kent Police's main options are either moving the northern parts of Sevenoaks District into West Kent or moving the central and southern parts of Sevenoaks District into North Kent.

Either way, it looks as if policing in the Well Area should improved no matter which way the decision goes as police would be based at Swanley which is rather closer than the current bases at Gravesend and Tonbridge!

STOP PRESS!

Kent Police have decided, after consultation with local people, that the West Kent Division will cover all of the Sevenoaks District Council area. Thus, soon we will find Cockerhurst, Park Gate and Well Hill policed by a single (West Kent Division) rather than the two (North and West) Kent divisions at present.

Kent Police's Chief Constable, Michael Fuller has given assurances that "the Area Commanders concerned will be developing a flexible approach to resourcing, ensuring that although the management and administrative overhead is based at Tonbridge, the most appropriate resources will attend in the event of an emergency and persons taken into custody are processed effectively at the nearest police station"- this can only result in better policing for our area.

Police Surgeries

The next police surgery is at the Rock and Fountain on Saturday 15th April from 11am to noon where you can have a confidential chat with PCSO Dave Birchall.

Well Hill Parish Council

We are awaiting a response from Sevenoaks District Council to our request for a separate Parish Council for Well Hill and Crockenhill. Being a separate Parish Council rather than part of Shoreham Parish Council (which covers Shoreham Village and Badgers Mount) would benefit us because:

- Well Hill and Cockerhurst have an independent identity from Shoreham and Badgers Mount
- Well Hill and Cockerhurst are far more rural than Shoreham Village and Badgers Mount
- Well Hill tends to use Orpington and Green Street Green for its services, not Sevenoaks
- Well Hill and Cockerhurst have different problems to those in Shoreham Village and Badgers Mount.

Shoreham at War

"The Shoreham at War project, recording the experience of Shoreham village in the Second World War, is nearing fruition.

Under the terms of our grant from the Local Heritage Initiative we undertook to make available a free copy of our book for every household in the parish. We will be holding a launch event in Shoreham Village Hall, provisionally fixed for 27th April, at which we will be giving away a copy to every eligible household. Copies will also be available at the Society's regular meetings for the rest of the year." Ed James

BROADBAND

Broadband via the telephone network (ADSL) is a distance-limited technology, and is affected by several factors: the distance measured is the length of the cable run from the exchange to the property, which rarely runs in a straight line; poor quality lines increase the rate at which the signal degrades, particularly if there is a mixture of aluminium and copper cables or overhead wires in the circuit; and at the margins electrical interference from household equipment can have a marked effect.

Over the last few years BT has gradually upgraded signal strength in order to increase coverage (from about 4 kilometres in the beginning to around 7 or so kilometres now) – but has reached the limit of this particular fix. However, there are two new programmes of work that should benefit our area (amongst others):

Firstly, BT are releasing the next generation of ADSL over the next few months – called ADSL Max. This might increase coverage slightly, as it is using more up-to-date hardware.

Secondly, BT are investing in upgrading all their exchanges and local networks via the Twenty First Century Network (21CN) programme – starting now and completing by 2009. This will put new fibre into the network, and repeater stations, to bring every property within broadband range.

In the meantime, it might be possible to gain access to broadband via alternative means such as wireless.

GO WILD IN THE GARDEN

Budding gardeners who want to find out how to make their gardens a haven for local wildlife can take advantage of a free one-off workshop later this month.

The 'Wildlife Gardening Workshop' is being organised by Sevenoaks District Council as part of its 'Gardening for Wildlife' award scheme. It will be held on Wednesday 19 April from 6.30pm to 9pm in Sevenoaks Community Centre, Otford Road.

The workshop will offer hints and tips on how to attract and protect wildlife when gardening. It is being run in partnership with Kent Wildlife Trust and North West Kent Countryside Partnership, and they will both be on hand to give advice and answer any questions people may have

on the evening.

This workshop is a wonderful way for people to share ideas and get answers to any questions on wildlife gardening. Everyone is welcome as it will not only help people who are unsure how to start gardening with wildlife in mind, but also give tips on making improvements to existing gardens that may already be attracting local wildlife.

The Council's "Gardening for Wildlife Scheme" was launched on 21 March and offers a free information pack, full of gardening ideas and advice to anyone who takes part.

The scheme rewards residents for their efforts to attract local wildlife to their garden. Entrants' gardens are judged on the range of wildlife friendly features available. They are then awarded a gold, silver, bronze or highly commended certificate accordingly.
